18 19 20 21	On February 21, 2023 the Salisbury City Council convened at 4:34 p.m. in a Work Session in Conference Room 306 of the Government Office Building following the adjournment of the Special Meeting.		
22 23	The following is a synopsis of the items discussed in Work Session.		
24 25	South Division Street - Rinnier Annexation Introduction		
25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32	Building Official Bill Holland explained the proposed property was located on the eastern side of South Division Street on the corner of Onley Road and was about 1.8 acres. On July 21, 2022 the Planning Commission approved the property to be zoned College and University. The plan was to develop the property into two apartment buildings with eighteen total units. The units were projected to be used for student housing and would include parking, street lighting, and dumpster enclosures.		
33 34 35 36	Once developed, the value of the annexed property would be approximately \$2,080,000 with an annual revenue of \$20,454, and a net estimated fiscal impact to the City of \$6,534. Mr. Holland recommended moving the annexation forward to legislative session.		
37 38	Council reached unanimous consensus to advance the annexation to legislative session.		
39 40	FY24-28 CIP Presentation		
41 42 43	Finance Director Keith Cordrey stated as a reminder to Council that this was a plan and did not appropriate funds for expenditures. It did not mean that any items included in the plan would necessarily be included in the City's budget.		

Deputy City Administrator Kitzrow discussed the need for another City owned parking garage downtown in the CIP.

Mr. Cordrey reported that Debt Service was less than 10% of expenditures. If it was completely implemented, and it never was, at the end of the five-year period there would be very little debt service remaining. The City's percentage of Bonded Debt was 5.8%.

Fire Chief John Tull said they were still looking for a location for a north side station and would also need to look toward the east side because the fire district went to Wor-Wic Community College now.

Police Captain Howard Drewer discussed the condition of the police fleet and reasons to gravitate towards a complete take-home program and shared vehicle program.

Field Operations Director Mike Dryden and Deputy Director Sam Ireland joined Council. Mr. Ireland discussed the aging playground equipment and replacement schedule. Mr. Kitzrow discussed the upgrading process for the parks and Ms. Jackson asked why Waterside Park had not been started. Ms. Gregory asked about the one-ton trucks and Mr. Ireland explained how they were used. She asked about the bridge repair in the Park and Ms. Glanz explained the bridge and bandstand repairs were funded through an endowment fund through the Community Foundation. Ms. Glanz and Council discussed the maintenance of Schumaker Pond.

ABCD Director Allen Swiger reported on the progress of the Poplar Hill Mansion's new handicap lift. It's historical value and the revenues generated by the events held was discussed. Potter's Field Cemetery was also discussed and the need for historical markers in the City.

DID Director Rick Baldwin discussed speed humps and speed bumps. Ms. Jackson remarked that one was needed on Parsons Road and Ms. Glanz said that Will White would work on that. Ms. Gregory discussed the South Park Drive erosion and flooded tennis courts, and asked about surfacing that would be more porous. Mr. Baldwin advised that construction with those types of surfaces was very expensive. Mr. Baldwin reported on the North Prong environmental clean-up on Lake Street at Ms. Jackson's request. Ms. Blake discussed the dark lights at the intersection near the Ward Wildfowl area and a general discussion on street lights was held.

Water Works Director Cori Cameron joined Council via Zoom. Discussion included the raw water line and City water towers.

Resolution to accept a Circuit Court forfeited rifle

Captain Drewer explained as part of the disposition of the criminal case handled by SPD officers, the gas operated rifle was seized from the defendant's residence pursuant to the execution of a search warrant. The Court ordered that the firearm be awarded to the City of Salisbury Police

Department to be used in their Tact Team.

Council reached unanimous consensus to advance the legislation to legislative agenda.

Mobile Crisis Presentation

Tina-Marie Brown, Director of The Sante Group, Alison Hunter-Jacobs, Coordinator, and Captain Drewer made the presentation on Mobile Crisis.

Ms. Hunter-Jacobs informed Council that Sante saw a lot of success. They had 29 cold contacts to connect people to available services. There were 27 cases they opened up to follow up with. Of those, 20 were adults. They did 127 phone contacts and 23 referrals. She highlighted a case of an adult female diagnosed with schizophrenia who was off her medicine, was very symptomatic and a high utilizer of the Police Department (PD). They got to know her and started building a relationship with her, and were able to connect her to the team able to provide her medication. She stopped calling the PD now and was stable. The change occurred in a few short weeks.

 Councilwoman Blake said Mses. Brown and Hunter-Jacobs were outstanding social workers. This was the one of the biggest things moving forward with Policing in the community. They would eventually be able to reach out to the Sheriff's Department with this program. They would love it and see the benefits for everyone, and it would save a lot of people.

Captain Drewer added that mental health and drug addictions fell in this arena. He relayed the vision of bringing other parties to the table. Sante specialized in finding the resources that people needed. President Boda thought that SWIFT may be a good partner on some of the things because they dealt with many similar issues.


Budget Amendment to accept a grant for chemicals and equipment at the WWTP

WW Director Cori Cameron reported on the request to approve a budget amendment to accept a grant from the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) for costs associated with the WWTP's Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) operation and maintenance activities. The Bay Restoration Fund (BRF) Operations and Maintenance Grant was in the amount of \$599,776.00 and was an additional \$149,776 over last year's grant of \$450,000.00. Based on 2021 ENR performance, the WWTP has achieved performance optimization and qualified for the grant. The funds would be used for the operations and maintenance of the WWTP. An additional \$495,000.00 was added to their FY23 chemical operating budget 86083-546004 to complete the budget year because chemicals were consistently increasing throughout the year. This grant would prevent WW from needing a budget amendment for chemicals. Ms. Cameron also requested the remaining \$104,766.00 be added to the equipment account #86083-534302 to purchase and repair equipment for plant maintenance.

148 149 150 151 152 153 154	Mr. Strickler reported the Santa's Workshop was run every year and was moved to Main Street for the third year now. This past Christmas the HCDD distributed 357 gifts to children, which trumped their previous record of 250 gifts. It was a great year and Draper continued supporting the program. This year the donation was \$5,000 which required the budget amendment to receive the funds into the account.

1.	Estab	lishr	nent

On ______, 20___ the City of Salisbury Homelessness Fund (the "Fund"), a non-endowed designated fund, was established at the Community Foundation of the Eastern Shore, Inc. (the "Foundation"), a charitable organization described in sections 501(c)(3) and 509(a)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Fund Representatives understand that gifts to the fund are irrevocable and will be used to maintain a charitable fund of the Foundation, subject to the Foundation's governing documents and bylaws.

2. Administration

The Fund will be effective upon the acceptance of this agreement by the Foundation. The Fund will be administered in accordance with the normal and customary policies for funds of the Foundation (available upon request). The Foundation may receive additional contributions from donors or other individuals or businesses as well as distributions from trusts, wills, private foundations, or donor advised funds to either initially fund or add to this Fund.

3. Distributions

This Fund will be a non-endowed fund to support:

City of Salisbury for use by the Housing and Community Development Department in addressing homelessness

Distributions from the Fund shall be limited to the fund's distributable amount determined in accordance with the Foundation's spending policy. Distributions may be made upon request, or scheduled on an annual, semi-annual, or quarterly basis, as requested in writing by a Representative listed below. The Representatives reserve the right to convert the fund to an endowed fund if the required minimum balances are met.

4. Representatives

The following positions in the City of Salisbury government may serve as representatives to the Fund with respect to amount and timing of distributions of the Fund:

- Mayor, City of Salisbury
- City Administrator, City of Salisbury

Representative privileges do not include the ability to change the Designee stated in section three, above.

5. Variance Power

This Fund is a component fund of the Foundation, and its assets are assets of the Foundation. The Fund is subject to the Foundation's governing instruments including the Foundation's power to modify any

restriction or condition on the distribution of funds for any specified charitable purposes or to specified charitable purposes or to specified organizations if in the sole judgment of the Board of Directors, such restriction or condition becomes, in effect, unnecessary, incapable of fulfillment, or inconsistent with the charitable needs of the community or area served.

6. Fees

The Foundation will assess administrative and investment management fees against the Fund in accordance with the Foundation's published fee schedule, as amended from time to time. The Foundation may also assess the fund to cover any unusual expenses incurred in connection with the contributed assets, including the cost of disposing of them, and in the administration of the Fund.

7. Investments

The assets of the Fund shall be invested according to the Foundation's investment policy, as it may be amended from time to time by the Foundation's Board of Directors. The undersigned acknowledges that investments are subject to market fluctuations and investment results will be allocated to the Fund.

8. Anonymity/Publicity

To recognize and honor our donors, the Foundation's policy is to include our donors' names in publicity about the Foundation unless they wish to remain anonymous.

The undersigned are the founders of the Fund and agree to the terms of this Agreement. This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of Maryland. Foundation is authorized to amend this agreement to conform to the provisions of any applicable law or government regulation.





This Agreement is made on this [March 1, 2023], between Throw Away Dogs Project, of PO Box 641, Huntingdon Valley, PA 19006, a corporation organized under the laws of the state of Pennsylvania ("Donor"), and [Chief Barbara Duncan], of [Salisbury Police Department ("Donee").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the goal of the Donor is to RESCUE, REHABILITATE & RELOCATE misunderstood dogs so they can now have a purpose to be HONORED, RESPECTED & TRUSTED as Law Enforcement K9 working dogs.

WHEREAS, the Donee is in need of a police service dog for Explosive Detection;

WHEREAS, the Donee filled out an application for a Police Dog, a copy of which is attached as Exhibit A [attach appropriate application] to this Agreement;

WHEREAS, the Donee was chosen to be the beneficiary of one of Donor's Police Dogs (hereinafter referred to as "Police Service Dog" or "K9").

In consideration of the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, it is agreed as follows:

ARTICLE I.

POLICE K9 DONATION

§1.1. Consideration. In consideration of Donor donating a Police Dog to Donee, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged by Donee, and for the further consideration mentioned in this Agreement, Donor agrees to donate and will deliver to Donee or its assigns, and Donee will accept the following-described K9, under the following terms and conditions:

ARTICLE II.

§2.1. Experience. Donee has been told and is aware that the dog which Donor accepts into its program are acquired through Broker/Breeder donation, owner surrender/shelter surrender or rejection. Although the Donor has trained its Police Dogs, due to the background of the dog, an experienced handler is required for the Police Dog that is the subject of this Agreement. This handler must be approved by Donor.

§2.2. Living Requirements. The Police Dog must live, at all times, with its assigned handler in his/her home. The dog shall not, at any time, be kenneled for more than a few hours at any police/sheriff department to include correctional facilities away from the assigned handler. This does not include kenneling as related to the assigned handler being out of town for vacation, classes, etc. as long as the dog is kenneled in a safe environment with adequate food and water and well-being checks throughout the time the handler is away. If Donee intends to house Police Dog outside, whether at handler's home or at a department, Donee shall at all times make certain the outdoor conditions are adequate for the dog's comfort and survival. Adequate outdoor conditions shall mean the dog has shelter, adequate food and water and shall take into account outdoor temperatures and changing weather conditions. Routine well-being checks shall be required whenever a dog is placed outside for any period of time. At no point shall Police Service Dog be left outside when the temperature is 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower or 90 degrees Fahrenheit or during a Heat Advisory or during a Severe Weather Warning.

§2.3. Replacement of Handler. The Police Dog under this Agreement shall always have an assigned and experienced handler. If the originally-approved handler can no longer fill his/her role, a new handler must be chosen. Donor shall be informed of any changes to the Police Dog's handler within twenty-four (24) hours. Should a new handler be required, Donee must first get approval from Donor before integrating a new handler with the Police Dog.

§2.4. Inspection. Prior to the donation of the Police Dog being made, the assigned Handler shall be required to personally train/handle the Police dog for at a location the Donor selects. During that training period, Donor shall also have the right to inspect the Police Dog. During the training period or in the two weeks following, Donee must give notice to Donor in writing of any issues he/she notices in regard to the temperament, condition, quality, or grade of the Dog, and must specify any issues in detail.

§2.5. Breach. Donee's failure to comply with any of the provisions in this section shall constitute a forfeiture of the Police Dog where Donor will immediately be able to take possession of the dog and a waiver of any liability or responsibility that Donor has to the Donee, its heirs or assigns.

ARTICLE III.

COVENANTS AND WARRANTIES

§ 3.1. Donor Covenants. Donee recognizes that Donor obtains its dogs from Broker/Breeder donation, owner surrender/shelter surrender or rejection. Donor covenants that, upon delivering the Police Dog, Donor shall have filed all the necessary paperwork to obtain ownership of the dog and, shall conform to the description of the Police Dog that was exhibited to Donee above.

§ 3.2. Donor's Tests. When Donor selects dogs for its program, it runs several temperament tests on its Police Dogs to ensure that they have the capacity and personality to be a working dog. In particular, Donor has evaluated the dog's social skills, evaluated the dog in a variety of different situations to ensure it is stable in all types of environments, evaluated the dog's drive and determination to serve as a Police Service Dog, and ensured the dog is physically in shape to carry out the many duties of a Police Dog.

§ 3.2. Donee Warranties

- A. Donee agrees to house, feed, and always maintain the Police Dog to the satisfaction of the Commanding Officer of its K9 unit.
- B. Donee shall complete all the Police Dog's training within one hundred fifty (150) days from the date of this Agreement. If the dog's training is not completed within that time frame, Donee shall immediately notify Donor. If after discussions with Donor, an agreed-upon extension cannot be reached, Donor shall be able to immediately take possession of the Police Dog and Donee shall forfeit the donation.
- C. The Donee agrees to contact the Donor immediately if any questions or concerns arise about the Dog, such as housing, diet, temperament, health or training. If at any time Donee believes that the Police Dog becomes unacceptable for training, Donee must immediately notify Donor in writing.

§ 3.3. ADDITIONAL WARRANTIES.

- A THE Donee WARRANTS AND COVENANTS, UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCE, EVER TO SURRENDER THE POLICE DOG TO A SHELTER, RESCUE, SELL, GIFT, OR DESTROY IT.
- B. If the Donee is unable or unwilling to maintain the Police Dog for any reason, or finds it unacceptable for training, the Donor retains right of first refusal to take possession or the Donor will assist the Donee in placement of the Police Dog into a new suitable home. The Police Dog is never to come into residency with any other individual without prior written, signed and notarized consent of the Donor. The Police Dog MUST be returned to the Throw Away Dogs Project.
- C. The Donee agrees to provide yearly veterinarian exams, appropriate vaccinations and heartworm preventative, flea & tick preventative as well as to provide appropriate veterinary care should the puppy/dog become ill or injured.
- D. The K-9 will be gifted to the handler once the K-9 is retired from service with signed agreement and release of liability.

E. I, print name:________, authorize Donor to this Agreement to contact our veterinarian to request & obtain health records for the dog outlined in this contract.

F. In the event that the Police Dog passes away, Donor must be notified immediately. The Police Dog's body must be brought directly to its primary veterinarian's office where an autopsy must be promptly done. Should Donee not have money for an autopsy or should Donee not wish to pay for an autopsy, Donee must immediately notify Donor so he can send funds to have the autopsy completed. AT NO TIME SHALL THE POLICE DOG BE EUTHANIZED WITHOUT NOTIFYING THE DONOR FIRST. At no time shall the Police Service Dog be cremated. Once an autopsy is completed, the Donor shall be notified so it can pick up the dog's body or work with Donee to schedule a respectful funeral.

WAIVER AND RELEASE OF LIABILITY

The Donee desires to receive a Police Dog by the Donor, and as an inducement to the Donor to agree to the donation, the Donee hereby represents, acknowledges and agrees as follows:

 Due to the unpredictable nature of animals, certain risks and dangers may occur while caring for an animal, even a trained animal, including risks of injury to person and property.

2. Donee has voluntarily agreed to accept the donation described in the Agreement attached to

this Release and Waiver Agreement with full knowledge of such risks and hereby voluntarily

assumes all of such risks.

3. Donee acknowledges that Police Dog will undergo a training program according to Donee's

Department requirements. This training shall constitute a material alteration to the Police Dog,

thus forfeiting any products liability warranties.

4. Donee will not make any claims against, sue or attach any property of the Donor, its directors,

officers, agents, employees and/or volunteers for any injury or damage caused by any animals

donated from the Donor.

5. Donee hereby voluntarily releases, discharges, waives and relinquishes any and all actions or

causes of action for personal injury, property damage or wrongful death occurring to the Donee,

or to third parties as a result of any action or activity of any animal(s) donated to me from the

Donor. The intent of this instrument is to exempt and relieve the Donor from ALL liability for

personal injury, property damage or wrongful death caused by negligence or otherwise.

- 6. Donee hereby agrees to hold Donor and its directors, officers, agents and/or employees harmless and indemnify them from and against any liability, claims, judgments or expenses I may incur arising out of the donation of a Police Dog from Throw Away Dogs Project.
- 7. THE UNDERSIGNED HAS CAREFULLY READ THE FOREGOING, AND UNDERSTANDS THAT TOGETHER THEY CONSTITUTE A DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY BY THE DONOR AND A RELEASE OF ALL CLAIMS BY ME. I UNDERSTAND THAT I ASSUME ALL RISKS INHERENT IN MY DECISION TO ACCEPT THE DONATION OF A POLICE DOG FROM THE DONOR AND ANY RELATED ACTIVITIES. I VOLUNTARILY SIGN BELOW TO EVIDENCE MY ACCEPTANCE OF THE ABOVE PROVISIONS.
- 7. If any portion of this Release is held invalid, it is agreed that the balance hereof shall continue in full legal force and effect.
- 8. This Release is governed by the laws of the State of Maryland applicable to Agreements entered into and fully performed therein.
