The following 161 is a synopsis of the comments made by 21 speakers: 162 163 SAPOA President said everyone supported clean water, sewer, fire and safety, and schools-164 • these were a top priority of government. There was a very negative impact of the proposed 165 increases to city citizens and the local economy. The \$300 fee was \$25 per month. \$80 166 monthly was the typical \$240 quarterly water & sewer bill. With a 12% increase it would be 167 an additional \$10. Due to the roughly 6% inflation rate, an average monthly expense of 168 *\$1,000, equaled an additional \$60 per month. When added with the new water bill and Fire* 169 fee, it equaled an additional \$100 per month. If the typical person earning \$42,000 per year 170

- received a 5% pay increase, the extra \$1 per hour would equate to \$160 per month and
 would be completely consumed by the increases. Employers were struggling through the
 high inflation and will be squeezed even harder. Do not vote for these increases.
- Speaker appreciated Council for doing their job. Several years ago the City had millions of dollars in Surplus. Water, sewer and trash were based on an event and decisions made ten or more years ago. Much was given away in permits and fees and would create an additional need for fire and police protection, medical and hospital. The City spent a lot of money on streets but potholes were not fixed. The \$300 fee would bankrupt his customers.
- Speaker on Zoom strongly agreed with the first two speakers. The increases were not trivial.
- \$300 was too much, and asked if the money would really go to where it was needed. This
 was a hard choice and Council had to balance the budget.
- Speaker worked in real estate and property management and saw citizens struggle for three 182 years due to Covid and the economy. Inflation was highest in 40 years. Water bills increased 183 8% last year and another 12% increase was being proposed. The median household income 184 for families in Salisbury was 31% lower than the national income. Citizens could not handle 185 these increases. The City was not tightening its belt but expected citizens to do so. Supported 186 the Fire and Police, but said in Title 2, Chapter 2 of the Municipal Code, taxes paid by 187 citizens entitled them to receive emergency services. By imposing a tax fee, the City was 188 setting a dangerous precedent that it could set a fee for any need in addition to property 189 190 taxes. Small businesses tightened their belts; government should, too.
- Speaker admired Council for their inclusiveness and objected to the "God Loves You" Tour. 191 • He reported that Rev. Graham made derogatory remarks against LGBTO people and other 192 minorities, and said he referred to Islam as a religion of war, and that Muslims and 193 *Christians could not worship the same god. He said that on Rev. Graham's Facebook page* 194 on November 18th it was sad to see a church open its doors to the worship of anything other 195 than the one true God of the Bible who sent his son the Lord Jesus Christ to Earth to save us 196 from our sins. This was criticized by Rev. Graham during a comment about a Muslim praver 197 service at the National Cathedral Episcopal Church established by a congressional charter 198 more than 100 years ago in Washington, DC. He has denounced Islam as an evil religion 199 and dismissed its veneration of multiple divine manifestations saving that none of its 9,000 200 gods would lead to salvation. The North Carolina Chapter of the NAACP objected to Rev. 201 Graham's comments regarding gay marriage and abortion during the 2012 presidential 202 campaign. In Newsweek in 2021 more than 16,000 Christians signed a petition calling for 203 him to be fired as the head of Samaritan's Purse. In 2020, Rev. Graham said that the 204 election was rigged or stolen, and referred to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day 205 Saints as a cult. It was too late to prevent him from coming and he did not represent the 206 values and opinions of large numbers of Christians nor the majority of the City citizens. His 207 presence did not help support the City's slogan, "We are all equal here." 208
- Speaker objected to the \$300 Fire Fee and increase in water bills. She resided in a senior citizen neighborhood and seniors would struggle to pay the increases.
- President of the Coastal Association of Realtors said the timing of the fees was wrong. For
 rental owners, the fees would be passed down to the tenants. Many rentals he managed were
 financed with Adjustable Rate Mortgages and the increased payments would be passed on.
- Executive Director of Salisbury PFLAG said there was disappointment and sadness
- wrapped around the "God Loves You" Tour. The LGBTQ and minority communities have
 been persecuted and marginalized for many years and they were tired of it. He said that it

was too late to oppose Rev. Graham to be here posed as a concert. The City took on a lot of 217 218 responsibility regarding sponsorships, hosting and partnering with organizations and nonprofits and he understood the desire to make this a large area in which various events were 219 220 accepted, and then offered a neutral solution that as long as they completed the permit and all regulations were complied with, events would be allowed. Let the hate crimes, and the 221 city, state and federal laws supersede to take over and let the first amendment rights take on. 222 It was the City's responsibility to ensure all events were possible, not that all events should 223 happen. He encouraged anyone agreeing with him to not encourage hatred and bigotry. 224 Speaker lived at a 55+ retirement community and asked Council to keep in mind that most 225 of the residents were 75 -90 years old, on a fixed income, and paid their own water bills. 226 Salisbury PFLAG member said that Salisbury was a city of love and should not stand with 227 • this hate and divisiveness. Everyone had their own beliefs, but she did not think the City 228 should have promoted the "God Loves You" tour. She quoted trans activist Martha P. 229 Johnson, "How many years has it taken people to realize that we are all brothers and sisters 230 and human beings in the human race? How many years do we have to fight?" 231 Speaker said that after 29 years she had a medical emergency with an ambulance and was 232 charged even though she paid for it for 29 years in taxes. She was on a fixed income and 233 \$300 was a lot of money. Exempt those over the ages of 65 if they were going to pass the fee. 234 City employee said she was embarrassed and sad to be part of the organization after the 235 comments were made at the last Council Work Session. It was stated that the Billy Graham 236 Association was an anti-LGBTQ hate group. Viewing homosexuality as unbiblical did not 237 qualify organizations as hate groups. She asked those Council members who said that events 238 like that should never happen again, if they were saying that the message of God's word and 239 hope should never take place in Downtown Salisbury. She said that 64% of the population in 240 the U.S. were Christians and 7% was made up of the LGBTQ community. Three of the five 241 election polling locations were churches. Why was the City able to use them for the election 242 but the churches not allowed to practice their beliefs Downtown? She asked why the City 243 couldn't fly the Christian flag since they could fly the Pride flag. "Equality for all" seemed 244 to exclude Christians. The script of her testimony has been included as part of these minutes. 245 Speaker thought people were upset because the citizens were now paying for the mistakes of 246 the previous City administration, years of funding vanity projects that did not increase the 247 quality of life or benefit the average citizen. The citizens were asked to pay the Fire Fee but 248 the County was not asked to pay their fair share. The previous administration gave hundreds 249 of thousands of dollars in tax breaks that have long-term effects to developers putting up 250 huge buildings. He asked why the City was looking at increasing already bloated taxes. 251 Before citizens were asked to pay the Fee, the County needed to pay their share. He was 252 tired of seeing his Fire Department friends moonlight and work extra hours to make ends 253 meet. After listening to the concerns of senior citizens, they had to find another solution. 254 255 Speaker said that city residents paid taxes to the City and County. He was a senior citizen, retired building contractor and landlord. He would have to pass along the \$50 fee to his 256 tenants. He was concerned about excluding Rev. Graham from coming to Salisbury. 257 *Everyone should have the opportunity to speak their religious feelings before the public.* 258 Homeowner owns rental properties, maintains affordable rent and values her rental clients. 259 • They live on budgets and need time to adjust to increases. She would increase \$25 per 260 month to cover the Fire Fee. Since it would begin July 1st she had no time to provide notice 261 to her clients of the increase. She mitigated prior increases in her own budget and did not 262

- pass it along to her clients. This was a much larger amount that she would have to pass 263 along. To many this would present a real hardship when coupled with the 12% rise in water 264 bills. For perspective homeowners, this could mean the debt to income ratios would no 265 longer allow perspective homeowners to qualify for loans. She valued first responders and 266 knew supplies had skyrocketed. She asked: 1) what caused this to become a cataclysmic 267 situation, 2) who said it was alright to eliminate the fees for new construction, 3) who 268 authorized the hiring of new employees, 4) who justified the purchase of new equipment, 269 cars, office supplies, computer software, etc. 5) was the City financially sound and did we 270 still have a great bond rating, 6) how was all this effecting those and other issues, 7) what 271 was the money going for from the sale of parking lots and real estate. A budget shortfall 272 should have been seen long before a new fee was deemed necessary. Citizens need answers. 273 Speaker said that Rev. Franklin Graham's hate speech was well documented. Based on an 274 • employee's comments demeaning others in the community, and that she and her family's 275 presence and Pride month was offensive, she would be happy to deliver diversity, equity and 276 inclusion training. Salisbury PFLAG came to Council last week and expressed their shock 277 and hurt that the City was actively promoting the Tidewater Tour. While the event will still 278 happen, the City was no longer actively promoting it. She said it would cause pain and 279 further marginalization of the LGBTQ community in the City where they actively had 280 individuals sitting on the school boards and in elected County offices who covert with the 281 282 coalition of hate mongers, maintain a blog propagating cruel lies with the purpose to erase and ostracize LGBTQ youth in our schools and community. Diversity was one of our 283 significant community assets, but groups that espouse intolerance and bigotry such as those 284 led by Rev. Graham with a long history of anti-LGBTO hate speech create division and 285 conflict within communities and families. LGBTO rights have been challenged in legislation 286 and school board meetings across the nation and on the Eastern Shore. We can look fondly 287 288 at events such as Juneteenth and the Salisbury Pride Parade and Festival to create a more welcoming community. She said her gay son applied to be an intern to the City of Salisbury 289 and she now had to worry that the City employees were like the woman who called them 290 offensive and an affront to her biblical values. She asked if this was the City we want to be. 291 The script of her testimony has been included as part of these minutes. 292
- Speaker said he was present to engage with the closing statements of Mayor Heath, and 293 • Council women Gregory and Outten at last week's meeting regarding their disappointment 294 with the "God Loves You" event scheduled for May 4th at the TidalHealth pavilion. He said 295 that Ms. Gregory deemed the group a hate group, stating it would be harmful to her family 296 members and the City constituency to have Rev. Graham come and spread a message of 297 hope to the residents of Salisbury. It was also said the local body would do what it could to 298 ensure such events did not happen especially because such successful work had been done 299 by and for the LGBTO community. He stated they were only opinions at that point, but did 300 301 seem to suggest that they would work on making sure this did not happen again. Speaker asked who deemed which groups were hate groups, and was the "God Loves You" tour a 302 hate event because it was coming. Rev. Graham leads Samaritan's Purse, one of the most 303 accomplishing humanitarian endeavors in world history. They set up hospitals and help 304 every type of person including gay, lesbian, and transgender people for every kind of crisis. 305 They set up a hospital in Central Park in New York during the height of COVID and served 306 307 people from every walk of life. No one was forced to attend the "God Loves You" event, but if you go, you will hear that God loves you. The vocal majority of Council was more content 308

309		to have a month-long celebration that glorified expressions of sexuality which culminates in
310		an all-day Pride event, kicked off by a drag queen leading child through Downtown. He
311		asked what the collective effort was of LBGTQ. It seemed to evolve around the sexualization
312		of children, the villainization of any affirmative therapy, and the targeting of socially and
313		psychologically suffering children for mutilating medical experimentation. He asked if that
314		group should be allowed to parade itself through the streets for an entire month, but for one
315		night for a couple of hours, this Council could not stand the thought of having one of the
316		most accomplished humanitarians in the world tell its citizens that God loves them. He
317		asked who established what was hate, and when it came to hurt, what about the hurt that the
318		LGBTQ also brings to families and groups. It would be unjust to exclude a group like
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319		Franklin Graham's Evangelistic Tour. He just wanted to promote a message that saves.
320	•	Speaker's parents listened to Billy Graham when she was a child which set her foundation.
321		When she grew up and moved away her life led into negative areas. She was now a 20 plus
322		year recovered addict and grounded through her roots. She said she felt that the Grahams
323		taught love and acceptance and disagreed with placing a contingence on who could speak.
324	٠	Speaker said that nearly 40% of the local constituency in Wicomico, Dorchester, Worcester,
325		and Somerset were people of faith. If Council enacted legislation, it would be in direct
326		contradiction to the rights enumerated in the U.S. Constitution. If that was the City's course
327		of action, then they must allow for the same erasure of rights towards any group whenever
328		petitioned here forward and in perpetuity, otherwise be in direct violation of Title 18, United
329		States Code, Section 241, Conspiracy Against Rights. He asked Council to reconsider.
330	•	Speaker and his wife were in the U.S. Army where they swore to defend the Constitution,
331		religion, rights and freedom of speech. He said he understood some of the concerns
332		regarding freedom of speech, such as if Rev. Graham was threatening violence against the

Regardless 386 of whatever good they did, she said it did not undo the harm that their words and actions did, and 387 the work they did against our marginalized communities. She would always speak out against any 388 group that did harm to any members of our community. She had family, friends and loved ones in 389 the community, and would stand up for them. She said she believed in the First Amendment and 390 there was never suggestion of legislation. Legislators should be contacted before accusations were 391 made. The proposed budget was very difficult and everyone was feeling the pinch. Council would do 392 the best to do the right thing for everybody. It would be a good idea to designate the money for the 393 Fire Department and she hoped constituents would go to the County Council Meeting to voice their 394

395 396 opinions.

397 *Ms. Jackson appreciated the constituents coming out and speaking their minds and reminded*

- everyone about the press conference tomorrow. Delegate Sheree Sample-Hughes was holding a
