Per the US Census, Salisbury is the MD city with the highest percent population at or below the poverty level - Close to 25%. Of course, they aren't making enough to pay taxes.

Add to that about ¼ of the property inside the City was removed from the City Corporate limits, decades ago. Just look at the map on page 45 of this meeting's agenda package. What a nice favor these privileged folks inside the City opted into and continue to exploit by not paying any City taxes.

SO one half of the City is not eligible to pay City property and income taxes. But the rest of us are paying excessive City property and income taxes, thereby supporting the 50% who are not.

Salisbury's city boundaries are one of the most gerrymandered in the nation. Fixing this is an effort that should be started right now. Mayor and City Council, I call on you to propose a resolution, at your next meeting, to change this inequity.

Thanks to recent years' over spending and the recently approved budget, we now have THE highest real property tax rate in a state that already had one of the highest rates in the nation.

So, City Leaders' solution to all this is to build 6,000 more homes, to bring in more tax payers. Well, duhh--Taxes are one of the main factors that prospective newcomers consider. Anyone who moves here will probably leave fast, once they see their tax bill.

Who of our current leaders and candidates are talking about how to add new jobs here? Without thousands of new jobs, the thousands of new homes in the pipeline are pointless.

FYI, the City's own analysis of the HERE IS HOME program tells that it gives about \$43 million to developers by removing their hookup fees. \$43 million can run the City for a year! <u>Unless City Leaders commit to avoiding more of these giveaways to developers</u>, the drain on our revenue base will continue.

You must start examining the true, whole life-cycle cost of using grants to build new questionable infrastructure. Maintenance budgets are woefully ignored when looking at these "bright penny" projects. Local government employees and taxpayers are the people who will pay the cost. Not to mention, the very folks we hope to raise up, the underprivileged sector, who end up with poorly maintained public facilities that they must rely on.

21 22 23 24 25	Mr. McConaughey provided an overview of the Health Department's accomplishments over the past year and discussed the following: COVID, flu, RSV and their vaccines. The Eastern Shore had an increase in overdoses of Xylazine. Wicomico County had 45 fatal overdoses from May 2021 to May 2022 and 39 from May 2022 to May 2023.
26 27 28 29 30 31 32	The Health Department participated in many events including Overdose Awareness Day and the Go Purple Kick Off Event. They received three accreditations for five years, and were the 4 th Health Department in Maryland to receive re-accreditation for the next five years meaning they upheld quality improvement, quality assurance, and the best standard of care. They had improvements in mental health clients and increased training in mental health first aid and Narcan training. The Strategic Plan was recently developed and would carry them to 2027. The Annual Report was on the Health Department's website.
34 35 36	Ms. Gregory said the vaccine for RSV was a huge deal. Mr. McConaughey said it was also available for young patients. Ms. Outten asked for the overdose decrease (13.4%).

39 40 41 42	Budget amendment to accept funds from the State of MD Grant for Infrastructure Improvements City Administrator Andy Kitzrow reported the City received \$4 million in PAYGO
43	funding and received \$2 million authorized next year for infrastructure improvements to

Lot 10. Without it, the redevelopment of the site to include a hotel and conference center would likely not happen due to rising costs and interest rates.

Council reached unanimous consensus to move forward with the budget amendment.

Budget amendment to appropriate fund for the Maryland Folk Festival

ABCD Director Allen Swiger requested an amendment to appropriate funds for the 2024 Maryland Folk Festival (MDFF) scheduled for September 20-22, 2024 to be used for all operations of Folk Festival including staffing, production fees, artists fees and equipment, staging, lighting and more. \$85,012 would be required for this program to be transferred from the General Fund in addition to the revenues listed below:

ABCD determined that \$589,700 in appropriations were required for the 2024 MDFF, exclusive from grant funding (below). \$125,000 in grants should be awarded.

The current forecast for the MDFF FY24 Revenues is as follows:

61 Event Revenues (Beverage, Vendors) 55,000 62 Sponsorships and Donations 449,688 63 Transfer – General Fund 85,012

64 Total \$589,700

Ms. Outten asked when they could hear responses on the grants and Mr. Swiger said it would be early Spring.

Mr. Doughty asked if the budget and schedule were altered for next year in case of inclement weather and Mr. Swiger said funds were built into it for that. They saw the risks with rainouts two years in a row but did not lose money despite the rain.

Council reached unanimous consensus to advance the legislation to legislative agenda.

Cannabis- Zoning Code modification

City Planner Brian Soper and City Attorney Laura Ryan presented the proposed amendments to the Zoning Code to permit growing, processing and dispensing cannabis in the City. The districts for growing and processing were Light Industrial and Industrial Park. The Industrial Zoning District was not included due to the location and existing uses. The locations were the Cato Office Building on Parsons Road, the Wastewater Treatment Plant location, and the old Dresser-Wayne facility. The dispensary would be located in the General Commercial District via an Ordinance Permit. This allowed additional review by the Planning Commission and Council to pass an ordinance after Planning Commission recommendation and public hearing. The Planning Commission held their public hearing on October 19th and forwarded a favorable recommendation.

President Jackson asked if most dispensaries would be placed in poorer neighborhoods. Mr. Soper said they did not know of any locations yet and would let Council know.

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Council reached unanimous consensus to proceed to the text amendment's next phase.

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Public Comments (related to agenda items)

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The following public comments were received by five members of the public:

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• Asked if the City could exist without grants. We are taking money from the rest of Maryland so the City could be in the development business. Ref: Agenda Item entitled "Budget amendment to accept funds...State of MD Grant for Infrastructure Improvements..."

I have just completed looking at the Sanborn Maps for the Lot 10 area: 1931 - 1950 Image 5, enclosure below. This is the Lot bounded by E. Church St, S. Salisbury Blvd (now known as Rte 13), Calvert St and Poplar Ave. It is being considered for a hotel-conference center and associated parking garage.

I do not see any major source of contamination such as filling stations or auto repair facilities. (
Please note that I am not qualified to make such a preliminary assessment of this risk. That is the
job of City Staff and I hope they are "on it." But prior council agenda items and discussion lead me to
believe this may not be the case, so I am trying to make you aware of my concern.)

Due to the many dwellings, a church, undertaker and other commercial-light industrial buildings, shops, once located there, one may safely assume that each has associated with it an underground heating fuel oil storage tank. These eventually rust and leak. Sometimes the owner uses them up before abandoning and the empty tank is left in place. For an individual homeowner or farmer, the state allows the empty tank to be excavated and hauled away to a landfill or metals recycler that accepts such items. (From my experience renovating a MD farm in 2005)

However for non-individual homeowners (governments, businesses) there are more stringent and costly requirements for disposal. The City could be on the hook for excavating and properly disposing of dozens of underground fuel oil storage tanks (empty or with product) and any associated contamination of the soil or removal and proper disposal of "product" left in or around them.

Back in 1960s when the City declared these areas surplus and bulldozed down the structures, they may have had the foresight and taken care to excavate these tanks. Records must be found to document it and precisely locate where. In the meantime it would be realistic and prudent to utilize the services of a licensed environmental engineering consultant to investigate the entire site for the presence of these tanks and other underground anomalies that would predicate further testing and possible remedial action.

So I firmly recommend the City proceed to secure proof that the sight is "clean" before entering into any real estate transaction involving Lot 10 (and/or any other parking lots that cover over prior structures). This is standard due diligence in managing and planning real property transactions. It is something that cannot be ignored since past, present and future owner(s) of a contaminated site are financially liable for any environmental contamination it causes. Ref. RCRA (Resource Conservation and Recovery Act), Title 40 of the CFR, and US Code Title 42. Other regulations and laws such as the Toxic Substances Control Act may pertain depending on the type of contamination found. I hope there is none, for the taxpayers' sake.

Please consider this potential cost in using the \$4-6 million grant.








WHEREAS, the City has declared a 2009 Pierce Velocity Aerial Truck and a 1992 Ford F-350 Brush Unit as surplus and the vehicles have been sold at auction: and

WHEREAS, these vehicles were operated by the Salisbury Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, the City has received a total of \$238,187.50 from the proceeds generated from the auction sale and has placed the funds in the City General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the City Fire Department has use for the funds received and requests that \$238,187.50 be reallocated to the Fire Department Operating Budget for FY2024; and

WHEREAS, the budget amendment as provided herein must be made upon the recommendation of the Mayor and the approval of four-fifths of the Council of the City of Salisbury.

- Increase the Salisbury Fire Department's Medical Supplies Account (24035-546016) **(g)** by \$5,000.00

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY, **MARYLAND**, as follows:

Section 2. It is the intention of the Mayor and Council of the City of Salisbury that each provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein.

Section 3. Re: Budget Amendment – Naylor Mill Water Main Extension Project

The Department of Water Works has received notification from the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) that the City will receive \$4,874,910 in loan principal forgiveness for the Naylor Mill Water Main Extension project per the attached MDE memo dated October 16, 2023.

The project was initiated to extend the City of Salisbury's water service to the Naylor Mill Mobile Home Park (MHP) to connect residents to a municipal water system. Per the attached letter dated January 10, 2023 from the owners of the MHP, the private wells tested with high levels of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) and as a result, one well has been taken out of service. The community's drinking water system is operating solely from one well, with no alternative source of potable water should that well require repair or test highly for PFAS compounds in the ongoing quarterly sampling.

In June 2016, Salisbury completed a Water System Master Plan, which identified water production, distribution, and treatment system capital projects to improve pressure and redundancy in the City's water system. The Master Plan recommended the construction of a water loop from the Paleo WTP to the west to connect to the water mains in the Westwood Commerce Park. The Westwood Commerce Park is a dead-end section of the water system and has historically had low pressure. To extend water services to the Naylor MHP, a water main will need to be installed to the west of the Paleo WTP in Naylor Mill Road, following the alignment of the extension to Westwood that was proposed in the Master Plan. It is not good practice to extend the water main and create another dead end; therefore, the proposed project will loop the water main to Westwood. This will boost the pressure in Westwood and will keep the water from being stagnant due to dead ends with low flow demands. The water loop provides benefits for hydraulics, redundancy, and water quality.

Additionally, new water mains will be provided in the Naylor Mill MHP. Currently, the private water system is 2-inch mains, which does not provide for fire protection. The 2-inch mains do not comply with Salisbury's code for public water mains, and the older lines may not handle the increased pressure of a municipal water system. Therefore, new public 8-in water lines will be constructed in the MHP. Public utility easements will be provided for the water mains. The mains are sized to provide fire protection and fire hydrants will be installed at distances to meet the Code. Water service will be metered at each individual lot. This will not only remediate the MHP's PFAS-contaminated drinking water, but it will also provide each lot with adequate fire protection.



Funding for the entire project will be provided through loan principal forgiveness through the Maryland Water Quality Financing Administration. The project budget is as follows:

A/E Design	\$ 620,000.00
A/E Construction Management	\$ 420,000.00
Construction	\$ 3,275,000.00
Contingency (10% of Construction)	\$ 327,500.00
Administrative (3% of Construction)	\$ 98,250.00
Other (Water Connection Fees)	\$ 134,160.00
Total Budget	\$ 4,874,910.00

The loan closing cannot occur until construction bids are accepted by the Maryland Board of Public Works, therefore a budget amendment is needed to proceed with design. Design and administration is reimbursable using the loan principal forgiveness funds. Attached is an Ordinance to provide PayGo funds for the design and administration in the amount of \$718,250.



Dear Mayor Day,

As a part of the Maryland Department of Environment's (MDE) effort to understand the presence of PFAS in State drinking water, the water from wells 1 and 2 at Naylor Mill Mobile Home Park were tested. The results came back with repeated high levels of PFASs over 100 ppt for one well and less for the other. Together, with MDE, we agreed to stop using the well with such high levels. We are currently using one well and have no backup if that well went down. With this emerging health emergency, we are kindly asking the City of Salisbury to please extend water to our community and to each home. It is our understanding that, MDE has grant money available that can assist in the costs.

Naylor Mill Village Mobile Home Park is located at the corners of Naylor Mil Road and Log Cabin Road in Salisbury, MD. The community is comprised of 52 sites, of which, currently 42 are occupied. The Park owns the land and rents each lot to a single family that must own and occupy, full time, their manufactured home. Two central wells provide water to each lot (only 1 in use). Individual septic systems are on each lot. Each family/tenant is responsible for their own home, landscape and utilities such as electric and cable.

We are fortunate to have great residents. They are hard working or retired homeowners, who faithfully pay their lot rent (\$305-\$350/month) without any government assistance. Some still have monthly home payments while others have paid off their home loans.

Here are some statistics about our families:

100% own their home and rent the lot.

13.36 years is the average time families/tenants live here.

26% of our household are retired and have income of less than \$20,000.

98% of our households are living below the average income of \$60,000 and have an average household income of \$32,000, median of \$30,000.

36% of our household are minorities/people of color.

29% of households have school age or younger children.

To reiterate, we kindly ask the city to assist our community in providing emergency help to provide safe, affordable water to our tenants. Without your help, we will be unable to provide this service to our already disadvantage community. Thank you for your consideration.

ORDINANCE NO. 2842

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THE NAYLOR MILL WATER MAIN EXTENSION PROJECT.

WHEREAS, the City of Salisbury is eligible to receive \$4,874,910.00 of loan principal forgiveness from the Maryland Water Infrastructure Financing Administration ("MWIFA") for the Naylor Mill Water Main Extension Project ("Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Project is necessary to serve the Naylor Mill Mobile Home Park with municipal water; and

WHEREAS, the Project will improve the City's water distribution system hydraulics, redundancy and water quality by extending the water distribution system to loop to the existing water mains in the Westwood Commerce Park; and

WHEREAS, the loan closing cannot occur until construction bids are accepted by the Maryland Board of Public Works and, consequently, a budget amendment is needed to proceed with design and administration of the Project; and

The Sanitation Division within the Department of Field Operations encompasses solid waste collection and disposal, recycling collection and disposal, and street sweeping operations within the corporate limits of the City of Salisbury. In recent months due to constant maintenance of aging vehicles within the division's fleet, the current vehicle maintenance budget will not be sufficient enough to last through the remainder of FY 24. While two side loading sanitation vehicles and a single rear loading sanitation vehicle are anticipated to be delivered in 2024. The Sanitation Division is projecting to not have enough funding to meet already encumbered expenses, along with the daily maintenance occurrences.

Based on the monthly average expenses that the division is facing, the vehicle maintenance account will be depleted by January 2024. The Sanitation Division will require \$90,000 to be distributed into their Vehicle Maintenance budget in order to properly maintain their current sanitation fleet.




